Clinical Pearls....

- Avoid the use of sulfonylureas/TZDs in overweight/obese in type 2 diabetes
- Trandgender patients on HIV PrEP require early screening for Osteoporosis
- Adrenal Insufficiency can be reassesed in patients taking hydrocortisone but is not accurate with those taking Dexamethasone or Prednisone.


